





ParentMail Transition: What do I do with my ParentPay account?



In our last newsletter we outlined the new communication software ParentMail. As part of the package, Bolder will be using +Pay instead of our current ParentPay for meals, trip and other items.

All balances that remain in the 'MEALS' part of ParentPay will be carried forward to the new +Pay part of ParentMail. These funds go straight to our catering providers ABM Catering, and will be available when the students return to the Academy. They are effectively 'spent'

However, if you have placed funds into the holding account part of ParentPay, you can withdraw these funds to your credit card.

ParentPay will remain operational for the summer months but please DO NOT put any more funds into ParentPay for Bolder Students as they may not get transferred over to the new system once it has been set up. If you have children at other schools who are using ParentPay you will still need your account for them.

How to withdraw funds from the holding account (not meals)

To do this, login to your ParentPay account

1. From your homepage,

Select **Parent Account** (desktop) or click on the notes symbol (mobile – see image below)

2. At the bottom of your statement summary, select *Withdraw*.

Enter an amount between the minimum and maximum shown 3. Select *Make withdrawal*

The procedures may require checks to prevent fraud before it can process your withdrawal request. Most withdrawals are processed immediately, however, funds can take up to 10 days to appear on

Girolamo Cardano

(September 1501 – September 1576)

A doctor by profession, he was the author of 131 books. He was also a compulsive gambler. It was this last habit that led him to the first scientific analysis of probability. He realised he could win more on the dicing table if he expressed the likelihood of chance events using numbers. This was a revolutionary idea, and it led to probability theory, which in turn led to the birth of statistics, marketing, the insurance industry and the weather forecast.




Examples Student work


Helen and Sarah share some money in the ratio 2 : 3. Sarah receives £45 more than Helen. How much money does Helen receive?






