## Did you know vocabulary is split into 3 categories?

#### Tier 1 Words (basic vocabulary)

These are the words that students need to practice the most to help them for their Words we use all of the time: dog, cat, house, gree These are words that you will already know! GCSEs and beyond.

#### \*Tier 2 Words\* (Academic Vocabulary)

Sophisticated words that fit into lots of subjects.

The better knowledge you have of these words the more uccess you will have in all subjects! Examples: fundamental, affect, context, evaluate - They help with your writing, reading and speaking. These are the words that make you stronger!

#### **Tier 3 Subject Specific Terminology**

Words that you need to learn specifically for your subjects.

These more technical words are usually needed within a specific topic and are really important for classwork/homework and exams!

Examples in Science: catalyst, exothermic, dissection


Examples in English: dramatic irony, metaphor, tragedy



Each week for PREP students are assigned vocabulary activities using Tier 2 and Tier 3 vocabulary from their knowledge organisers.

All knowledge organisers are on the Bolder Academy website and every student has their own copy.


Students should spend at least 30 minutes on each activity for each subject at home (1 hour of homework per night – 2 subjects).





# **Vocabulary Websites**







Describing Words - This website has a simple premise: punch in a noun and you get countless descriptive words, with a helpful sort for 'frequency' and for 'uniqueness'.

Vocabulary.com- This bumper website has lots of uses, from a dictionary and countless vocabulary questions.

Online Etymology Dictionary - With a quick search, you can gain accessible word histories (alongside some very interesting articles).

A sentence must have a *subject* (someone or thing doing the verb) and a **verb** (an action - can change tense in the sentence) and can only be ended with a full stop, exclamation mark or question mark.

Capital Letters

Capital letters are used for proper nouns (names something or someone specific) and starts of sentences.

Proper Nouns: Jack, London, The Internet.





- Students must have an appropriate reading book as part of their equipment



- Students will have access to our Library at break times and one lunch time a week

- Students are encouraged to read for 30 minutes a day outside of school





- **STEP 1:** Students take a STAR reading test and receive their own book level range.
- **STEP 2:** Students must select and read books within their book level range.
- Students should be reading their book for at least 30 minutes every day.
  - **STEP 3:** Students log on to our Accelerated Reader website and complete a quiz every time they finish a book fully.
  - **STEP 4**: Students receive points, rewards and prizes for doing well on their book quizzes.
- **STEP 5:** Students complete two more STAR reading tests in the year to see if they have progressed with their reading level.



Renaissance Home Connect is a tool that keeps parents informed of their son/daughter's progress in Accelerated Reader and encourages children to practice reading at home.
